Canada and the US

- Have had very friendly relations for many years
- **Border is demilitarized**, meaning that neither side is guarding its border from the other

New Brunswick, eh?

- Capital: Fredericton
- 40% French descendants
- Harbored Americans who remained loyal to the British king in the Revolutionary War





Prince Edward Island (PEI), eh?

- Capital: Charlottetown
- Industry produces potatoes and cattle
- Mostly Scottish descendants
- Setting for Anne of Green Gables





St. Lawrence River

- Connects the Great Lakes to the Atlantic
 Ocean through a series of locks (gated sections of river to allow ships to ascend or descend steep sections of river)
- Very important for American and Canadian shipping

Quebec, oui?

- Capital: Quebec City
- French came to the region chasing furs, especially beaver
- Hudson Bay Company started in 1670 by the British to open up trade in northern Quebec
- French is the official language





Ontario, eh?

- Capital: Toronto
 - Banking center of Canada
- Most populous province
- Ottawa is the national capital of Canada, located in Ontario
 - Canada officially separated from Britain with the British North America Act in 1867 (though still part of the Commonwealth)







Manitoba, eh?

- Capital: Winnipeg
- Lakes Winnipeg and Manitoba dominate the province
- Metis are the descendants of French men and Indian women
 - One of the largest ethnic groups
- Produces a lot of grains and vegetables

Saskatchewan, eh?

- Capital: Regina
- Settled mostly by metis
- Vast wilderness
- Breadbasket of Canada
- World's leading producer of uranium





Alberta, eh?

- Capital: Edmonton
- Famous for mountain sports and rodeos
- Produces oil and timber






British Columbia, eh?


- Capital: Victoria
- Vancouver is the most important city, lying just north of Seattle
- Only Canadian province to touch the Pacific Ocean
- The Alaska-Canadian Highway (Alcan), which connects America to itself, runs through here (read p. 204)





Yukon Territory, eh?

- Capital: Whitehorse
- Famous for the Gold Rush to its Klondike in the 1890s
- The Alaska-Canadian Highway (Alcan), which connects America to itself, runs through here





Northwest Territories, eh?

- Capital: Yellowknife
- Mackenzie River here is the longest river in Canada
- Massive archipelago (island chain) in the Arctic Ocean here





Nunavut, eh?

- Capital: Iqaluit
- Territory name means "our land" in Inuit
- Inuits are the natives of the northernmost land of North America and Greenland
- **Baffin Island**, the largest island in Canada and the fifth largest in the world, is here
- Consists of 28 small villages with a total of roughly 30,000 Inuits
- Newest Canadian territory, approved for selfgovernment starting in 1999
